Aussies refuse Sri Lankan arms order

This supply for grenades, was to be made by a state owned Australian armament manufacturing company. Australian Defence Industries (ADI).

The matter came up for questioning in the Australian Parliament on Tuesday December 14th, when Defence Minister Senator Robert Ray said that Australian Government had decided, not to supply these grenades, as it was "against Australian national interests".

The supplying company is a state-owned industry the Australian Trade and Defence Ministries scrutinise and approve all export orders, diplomatic sources explained.

Many Human Rights organisations and the Tamil Expatriate Lobby in Australia had protested vehemently to the Australian Government over this request for supply of this

grenades to Sri Lanka, according to reports reaching Colombo.

Australian High Commission officials confirmed that the grenade import order had been turned down but refused to comment further.

Earlier too the Australian Defence Ministry turned down a request by the Sri Lankan government, for the suppy of ammunition for the Army's Saladin armoured cars.

Defence Ministry officials would not comment on the matter.
